Troubled Minds: The Divine Response

he recent suicide by a Pentecostal Pastor in India sent shockwaves among several born-again Christians. It's disgusting to realize that throughout the world, number of pastors and priests have committed suicide in the recent times.

We used to hear about suicide of distressed students and farmers, but seldom have we heard about spiritual leaders who are supposed to comfort and encourage the depressed ones, end their earthly life.

It's terrible to note that in spite of the best efforts by the authorities, the overall suicide rate is only increasing. According to statistics, worldwide around 8 lakh people die by suicide every year. In India 1.71 lakh took their life in 2022, which is 4.2% more from 2021. Experts say that for more than half of them, the immediate causes were problems in the family and illness. According to latest data, one out of four suffers from some form of mental disorder. Earlier it was one out of eight! Mind you, this vast number of distressed people may also include some of our own people of the family or fellowship

QUESTIONS:

Definitely, questions such as the following abound:

Can a born again child of God commit suicide?

Will a person who died by suicide go to heaven?

Even questions like, can a born-again child of God be plagued with such mental disorders?

It's good to discuss and debate on such topics to get clarity. However in this article, our intention is to highlight the fact that many of our own dear ones with whom we interact often may be facing untold miseries and concerns. It's primarily important to be compassionate

MEANING

What does this mean? There are so many around us who are troubled and traumatized beyond our imagination. Remember, there are many others who silently suffer various forms of mental agonies.

and considerate to them in their perils.

Yes, a true and healthy believer does not need to experience such emotional breakdowns. We have all the spiritual resources at our disposal to stay strong and survive such state of affairs. Nonetheless, not all are spiritually healthy, and sadly, even not all are true believers either!

HUMAN FRAILTY

Moreover, just as any healthy body could become sick, anyone can experience changes in the function of their brain too. It may be either due to physiological or medical issues; or adverse circumstances such as failures, various kinds of loss, etc. Add to that the guilt feelings due to unconfessed sins as well as satanic fiery darts could aggravate the situation.

Consequently, when their thought process or thinking habit is disturbed, it affects their attitude and behavior. They may prefer to be alone as they fear to face people in public. Filled with negativity and bitterness, they will find fault with all except themselves. If unchecked, in the course of time, they may be plunged into several other mental disorders affecting their spiritual life as well as interpersonal relationships.

HOW DO WE RESPOND?

What should be our response to such disturbed believers? Sad to notice that the most common response is that we ignore

them. Even the so-called godly and able spiritual leaders prefer to keep mum at such circumstances, leaving the suffering ones to fend for themselves! All these responses are just an effort to escape the reality and save their face from the possible repercussions.

BIBLICAL EXAMPLES

Scripture reveals the gracious dealings of our God toward such troubled hearts. Let us consider few examples:

a The fallen and frightened Adam, Genesis 3:9-11

Here we have the beginning of all human sufferings whether in body or mind. It must be stated unequivocally that the root cause for all the trouble that man is facing today is sin and his rebellion against God. The passage teaches how man had to bear the consequences of his sin.

At the same time, it's important to notice that God came in search of man even as he was experiencing the result of sin. God Himself did whatever could be done to solve the loss and fear Adam was facing then.

Here onwards we see God's patient and merciful effort to help the fallen and troubled man to change and make him a better person. The zenith of this work of salvation is seen on the cross of Calvary when the Lord Jesus Christ gave Himself as a sacrifice for sinful man (Rom. 5:8).

b The burdened and despaired Moses, Numbers 11:11-15

Upset by the complaint of people of Israel for provision, Moses felt so burdened and depressed, and he sought death! Even some commentators refuse to have any sympathy for Moses; however, we don't see the Lord God almighty rebuking Moses, on the contrary, He makes the arrangement to lessen his burden. Nevertheless, v. 33 shows that the troublemakers had to pay the cost of rebellion.

c The tired and scared Elijah, 1Kings 19:3, 4

The man of God who brought fire from heaven is now running away and pleading for death, all at the threat of a woman! The Lord's response to him also brings much comfort to all who face similar situations. The Angel of the Lord brought cake and water for his immediate need, and then, counseling, that too by visiting him twice with all patience (vs. 5-8). How thoughtful is our God, unlike man! He knew the current need of His servant. Therefore, Elijah too was restored.

We see numerous such examples in the Old Testament when God graciously dealt with the saints who were depressed even to the point of hating their life and restored them (cf. Job 3:21; 6:9; 7:15; Jeremiah 20:18; Jonah 4:3). Most of the psalms of David begin with lamentation but end up with praise and worship.

"For His anger is but for a moment, His favor is for life; Weeping may endure for a night, But joy comes in the morning." (Psalm 30:5)

"Many are the afflictions of the righteous; But the LORD delivers him out of them all." (Psalm 34:19)

THE COMPASSIONATE CHRIST

In the New Testament also we see the same compassion of our Lord for all the broken hearted. Throughout His public ministry, Christ comforted and reassured the troubled minds.

To a trembling woman He says, "Daughter be of good cheer"; to the helpless widow who was on the way to the funeral of her only son, the Lord said, "Do not weep"; to the penitent woman with tears the Lord said, "Your sins are forgiven... go in peace" (Luke 8:48; 7:13, 48, 50). Plenty of such incidents from the public ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ reveal His concern for the troubled minds.

His call to all who labor and are heavy laden continue to challenge many. Similarly, His comforting words to the distressed disciples always bring hope and assurance to His followers (cf. Matthew 11:28; John 14:1ff).

However, one of the most touching examples of the Lord's compassion to the broken hearted is in connection with Peter. The one who resolved never to deny His Lord did so three times; and this broke Peter's heart, he wept bitterly. Further, though he returned to fishing, yet the risen Lord visits His servant with breakfast and restored him (Matthew 26:33, 75; John 21: 5, 12, 15, 17).

EMULATE THE LORD

This is the attitude we ought to have for the feeble, fallen brethren. In the epistles we see believers have been repeatedly exhorted to do so: 2Corithians 2:6-8: "This punishment which was inflicted by the majority is sufficient for such a man, so that, on the contrary, you ought rather to forgive and comfort him, lest perhaps such a one be swallowed up with too much sorrow. Therefore I urge you to reaffirm your love to him."

Galatians 6:2: "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Hebrews 12:12, 13: "Therefore strengthen the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees, and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be dislocated, but rather be healed."

What a blessed privilege we have in the

Lord Jesus Christ! When many around us fail to find any meaning in life and any rays of hope, we have the everlasting consolation and sure hope in the Lord Jesus Christ. In addition, the enlightening and encouraging Word of God continues to motivate us.

We are not alone; apart from the ministry of the triune God, the prayerful support of the fellow believers strengthens us to move forward in spite of all the setbacks in life. Let us make use of these divine resources and enjoy the peace and tranquility that is nowhere else available.

Also, let us make sure no one among us would ever say, 'Nobody cared for me'!

Our Lord Jesus Christ comforts His people with these assuring words:


"Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in me" (John 14:1)

LET NOT YOUR HEART BE **TROUBLED**

"Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also." (John 14:1-3)

The chapter starts on a comforting tone evidently to a group of troubled hearts. Before we can ponder on those blessed words of our Master, it is worth considering the diverse manner of sorrows, the disciples carried at that moment:-

a. Judas' betrayal

The announcement of Judas' betrayal in the preceding chapter 'perplexed' everyone, and it came as a shocking revelation to all there except Judas (John 13:22). This perhaps shattered the confidence and the unity they had. The heaviness we might have, when one amongst us leaves us and sells his faith is really a shaking one, which can question one's own faith and trust to Him who taught us what love is.

b. Peter's denial.

The Lord's second revelation that again shook many feeble hearts was Peter's denial. Even though he vehemently countered it by a declaration to go to prison and even death, it is quite understandable the troubled state of the

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other ten that if one of Lord's bests three, could deny Him, where would they stand in the hour of trial!

Often our faith gets terribly shaken when someone we esteem to be strong in faith seems to drift away from it, to the extent of even denial of that faith.

c. Who is the greatest?

Luke briefly accounts this (Luke 22:23, 24), and interestingly it sprouts out just after the Lord reveals His betrayer – deriving a certain question in many minds, "if Judas is such and such, am I not far better?"

Apart from the fact that self-proclaimed righteousness breaks harmony, there lies a danger of comparison here, which leads to rivalry and a weak one or two being offended. It may not be a trouble for those who feel they are great, greater, or greatest, but it will cause disharmony and a weak believer to stumble.

Therefore, this was seemingly a trouble the Lord addressed in the opening verses of John 14. And it is not surprising that the Lord emphasized unity the most in His Priestly intercession following this discourse.

d. The Lord's departure

Out of all the troubles that bothered the eleven, this was perhaps the most painful. The questions posed by Thomas, Philip, and Judas (not Iscariot) in that very chapter bring out this pain on their faces.

And when the discourse continues to Chapter 16, the worries deepen as the Lord hints out to them the pain of suffering following His departure. They would have perhaps not imagined this would be His end, never such a painful death. A sense of hopelessness was evident here.

The Lord having sensed all these worries developed in the hearts of those poor souls in the Upper Room, comforts them beautifully:

I. "BELIEVE IN GOD, BELIEVE ALSO IN ME"

It is only our strong belief in God that can sustain us when we go through all what the disciples went through – weak in faith, being left alone when all around them drift away, ultimately, deny their faith and sell their Master. Trusting in God is the fulcrum of Christian faith, which wonderfully balances our worries and cares against God's unchanging promises.

Moreover, the Lord emphasized that they should believe in 'Him' as this chapter shows clearly that the Lord associates Himself to His Father in every way. When the entire nation rejected Him, the Lord desired that they know Him as the only way to the Father, and that they see the Father through Him! Indeed, the fundamentals of salvation demand that we believe Christ as the Lord, and our Christian life demands a continuing belief that whatever we ask in His name, He will do it, and the Father is glorified in this.

II. "IN MY FATHER'S HOUSE ARE MANY MANSIONS"

There is no dearth in His provisions. He has enough luxuries and in abundance – the disciples need not fight among themselves to determine who will win the race to get there first, there's room for everyone. A simple trust in the Lord's abundant provisions is enough to meet all our needs and wipe out all our worries, just like His grace in abundance to wipe out all our sins.

III."I GO TO PREPARE A PLACE FOR YOU"

The Lord was going – yes it emptied their hearts, but now He fills those empty hearts with an assurance that He is going to prepare a place for them.

His going and preparation included His suffering and His death before His resurrection and ascension. He went to

that extent, the cruel cross and the grave to prepare a place for us in those h e a v e n l y mansions!

The Lord further explains

how His departure is advantageous for us (John 16:7), for we would receive the Holy Spirit, who would guide, teach, remind, comfort us, and abide with us forever (Jn. 14:16, 26; 16:13)!

The Lord's physical absence and tarrying is certainly worrisome to some of us, but be assured, His Holy Spirit is a guarantee in our hearts (2 Cor. 1:22), while the Lord Himself prepares a place for us, those many mansions!

IV."I WILL COME AGAIN AND RECEIVE YOU TO MYSELF; THAT WHERE I AM, THERE YOU MAY BE ALSO."

Herein lies the essence of the finished work of Christ – He goes, He prepares, He comes, He receives, and He positions us where He is! He does not differentiate with us at all in those mansions. He receives all of us to Himself and will keep us where He is.

He has given us His comfort, His peace, and His Holy Spirit to our troubled hearts,

> for He knows us that we are feeble as frail. When He understands that our hearts are filled with sorrow, He

urges us to ask in His name, that our joy may be full (John 16:6, 20, 24).

He has chosen us, and even if we might have denied him, He prays for us that our faith may not fail (Luke 22:32). He encourages us to be cheerful in this world of tribulation, for He has overcome the world (John 16:33). Let us wait upon His promises, as His perfect and finished work on the cross is leading us to those mansions!

Do Trees Speak?

The "Methuselah" bristlecone pine tree is believed to be nearly 5,000 years old, earning the nickname Methuselah. This hardy tree thrives in harsh wilderness conditions where little else survives. It is found in the remote mountainous region in eastern California. Bristlecone wood is very dense and resinous, and thus resistant to invasion by insects, fungi and other potential pests. It is one of the gnarliest, severely twisted, and ghostly looking trees. Perhaps that's another reason why this tree has survived so long.

Any sensible wood cutter would just leave it in the woods. Its superabundant knots and crotches would break or blunt even the best tools. Moreover, any experienced woodworker would always choose wood with the least blemishes since the imperfections compromise the structural integrity of the timber, and the knots are hard to paint over. And if used as firewood, splitting and stacking the pieces would be another nightmare. You wouldn't want to wrestle to fit the pieces in the stove. In plantations, climbers ascend trees and handsaw off the branches. This helps the trees to grow straight and with the least imperfections. Clear pruning creates clear timber, free of knots.

The Speaking TREES

This helps us to understand Psalm 1:3 better which speaks of the person who is like a tree "planted" by the rivers of water. They do not conform to this world. Instead, they delight in and meditate on the law of the LORD day and night. So, their leaves never wither, and they produce fruit in due season for the LORD of the harvest.

Furthermore, Paul writes in 1 Cor. 3:9, "You are God's garden under cultivation" [AMP]. Think of the trees used extensively in Solomon's temple. The wall panels, the beams and rafters, the doors, the altar, the furniture, the carts, etc., were of the finest wood of Lebanon. They were all made with the choicest timber that were free of knots. In the inner sanctuary, walls had intricately carved cherubim in olive wood. Note that olive trees are also hardy, and the oldest living specimen is about 2000 years old! They bear useful fruit even in old age, and in their death, they still **speak** figuratively from the walls.



Also, we read about the wood offering (Neh. 10:34; 13:31), without which no sacrifice is possible. The priests had to ensure that the fire on the altar never went out. Nevertheless, consider this: would God accept any ugly, resinous, gnarly firewood that others have rejected? By the grace of God, let's offer the final remnants of our days to God in His service.

Experience speaks

Aging is quite different in trees than in humans; however, these 'grandpa trees' have many valuable lessons and stories to share. Physical changes and loss of health can cause us to experience irritability, sadness, and anxiety. We hear of aging gracefully and learning holistic tips that boost our longevity, including optimism, forgiveness, humor, curiosity, and gratitude. But that's like the tree swallowing the stubs of dead branches, which lead to the dead knots.

Let's heed to Christ's words here, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." We need to take all our cares to Him in prayer.

C.H. Spurgeon wrote, "We are not to fear old age. We are to grow graciously, since the LORD Himself is with us in the fullness of grace." Therefore, growing old graciously is not weakness. Rather, it is about being kind, courteous, pleasant, polite, civil, well-mannered, tactful, benevolent, diplomatic, considerate, thoughtful and friendly.

This can happen only if we allow the Husbandman to prune us with the Word of God; "It is living and powerful, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart". (Heb 4:12)

The Nebuchadnezzar Tree

King Nebuchadnezzar saw a dream about himself as a great and mighty tree with lovely leaves and abundant fruit as food for all. Beasts rested in its shade, and birds nested in its branches. However, it was chopped down and destroyed with only its stump and roots left tethered to the ground. It was a picture of his rise, fall, and restoration by God. Nevertheless, the king ignored God's warning against pride and Daniel's advice for repentance in thought and deed. When Nebuchadnezzar boasted about his power and majesty, God struck him with a strange mental disorder; he remained in that condition till he humbled himself and gave praise to God. I have no doubt that his best human counselor Daniel prayed all along for his restoration and God's glory. Since situations like this have a spiritual root cause and needs a spiritual answer, we need to sympathetically warn and pray for ourselves and others.

God says, "Listen to Me, O house of Jacob, and all the remnant of the house of Israel, who have been upheld by Me from birth, who have been carried from the womb; even to your old age, I am He, and even to gray hairs I will carry you! I have made, and I will bear; even I will carry and will deliver you". (Is. 46:3, 4). He may use His word directly or other agents to prune us. "Iron sharpens iron, and friends keep each other sharp".(Pro 27:17)

Anxiety, worry, depression, frustration, pride, arrogance etc., bring harshness and a critical spirit in the long run. Hardiness is essential, but harshness is to be avoided. God's word and good company will help us offer every part of our being as a living sacrifice, holy acceptable to God.

Let us be transformed by the renewing of our mind and say with the Psalmist, "But as for me, I am like a green olive tree in the house of God; I trust in the faithfulness of God forever and ever." (Ps. 52:8 [NASB])

"Come Unto Me"

onsider the words of the Lord Jesus Christ – "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

(Matt. 11.28)

"I am the bread of life. He who comes to Me shall never hunger, and he who believes in Me shall never thirst." (John 6.35)

"Come unto me," He says. He sets no demand of riches, religious standing, or regional background. But He wants us to, just as we are, to come to Him.



During the years of His public ministry, there came to Him many that were sick, afflicted, laden with burdens, and hopelesslylost.

Examples

Her agony was amplified by the social stigma that was associated with her disease. The custom of those times was such that whatever she touched became ceremonially unclean due to her disease. In another incident, a woman had a daughter who was grievously vexed with a demon. A demon-possessed person had no control of themselves. It would cause hurt to the body which it possessed or even bring about convulsions. The mother was in great agony seeing her child grievously suffer. In her desperation, she travelled a great distance and came to Jesus, and she found relief.

There's one more woman we can consider. This woman was ridiculed as a 'sinner'. It is true that "all have sinned" and therefore all are sinners. But only a public sin would taint a person into being called by society a 'sinner'. She was known by her sin. Oh the burden of regret and remorse she carried! She was grieved by her sin and needed forgiveness. In her sorrow,she came to Jesus and found relief.

Rest Unknown to the World

Is your heart burdened with a problem? Have you not as yet come to Jesus to find relief? There is a rest and satisfaction unknown and inexistent in this world that is found only in Jesus.

The burdens of this life are limited to the time we live in this world. But beyond this life, there is a life we have to spend either in heaven or hell. The only burden that we can possibly carry to the next life is the burden of sin. If we do not receive the forgiveness of our sins in this life, we are destined to eternal destruction in the next. Christ Jesus came to once and for all take away the burden of our sin. "All we like sheep have gone astray; We have turned, every one, to his own way; And the LORD has laid on Him the iniquity of us all." (Isa. 53.6) He died in our stead taking the punishment of our sins upon Himself so that in His death and resurrection we can receive salvation and the forgiveness of sin.

Confess

Are you burdened about your sin? King David in Psalm 32 speaks of how he was agonized by an unconfessed sin. "When I kept silent, my bones grew old through my groaning all the day long." But he further explains of how he dealt with his
